Health & Safety Corner

Reminder: When using electrical equipment (i.e. buffer vacuum) always unwind the cable fully and check for any cuts, breaks or wearing. Also check the plug for any signs of damage. When vacuuming or buffing always keep the cable behind you at all

times as this will protect the cable from becoming damaged.

Always move the machine as you have been trained to do and never pull the machine using the cable.

Caution Signs

Everybody has a duty of care under the 2005 Health and Safety Act to ensure the safety of their colleagues, client staff and the public. Caution signs must be

placed in such a way so as to alert people that cleaning is in progress. It is also very important to remove caution signs when the work is complete. If you are in any doubt please contact your Supervisor or Manager.

Tips for Winter Driving

Essential Information for Driving in Bad Weather Conditions

<u>Vision</u>—Through the Winter months dazzle from the low Winter sun can be a particular problem.

Improve vision significantly by making sure that your windscreen is clean – inside and out. Use air conditioning for faster demisting and to reduce condensation on cold windows.

Check windscreen wipers and replace if necessary.

Make sure that wipers are switched off in the park position when leaving the car when there is a risk of freezing as failure to do so could damage the blades or wiper motor when you turn the ignition on if the blades have frozen to the screen.

Windscreen washer fluid should be topped up and treated with a proprietary additive to reduce the chance of freezing in frosty weather.

<u>Visibility</u>—Check that all bulbs are working and that headlights are clean and aimed correctly.

You must use headlights when visibility is seriously reduced. You may also use front or rear fog lights but these must be switched off when visibility improves as they can dazzle other road users and obscure your brake lights.

<u>Tyres</u>—Check all tyres for condition and pressure. Get up at least 10 minutes earlier to give you time to prepare your vehicle.

Don't drive off like a tank-commander, with a tiny hole cleared in your windscreen. Clear all windows of snow and ice using a scraper and de-icer.

Put safety before punctuality when the bad weather closes in. While it's always a good idea to allow extra time in winter for your journey, drivers must accept the inevitability of being late for work if they are caught up in an unexpected delay.

<u>Driving on Icy Roads</u> —Gentle manoeuvres are the key to safe driving.
